

SOS JUSTICE PANEL TO EXPLORE POTENTIAL REFORMS TO REVOLVING DOOR JUSTICE SYSTEM

Forum available via livestream. Vancouver Mayor Ken Sim added as speaker.

VANCOUVER, B.C (Jan. 14, 2025) – Canada's justice system will come under the microscope on January 23rd when the Save Our Streets **Communities Driving Change Forum** kicks off with its **Justice for All: Challenges and Choices panel** featuring representatives from the BC Crown Counsel Association and BC First Nations Justice Council, along with former judge and B.C. Attorney General, Wally Oppal, and Nanaimo Mayor Leonard Krog, a lawyer who also served as MLA and opposition Attorney General critic.

In addition to its four expert panel presentations, the Forum will feature an address by Vancouver Mayor Ken Sim to begin the afternoon portion of the program. Also speaking will be Conservative Party of BC Leader John Rustad and a representative from the Province of BC.

Public safety and crime are issues of crisis proportions for British Columbians, with individuals, businesses, and communities feeling the daily impact of crime and street disorder. In SOS's province-wide survey conducted in September, only 38 per cent said they have confidence in the justice system to deal with crime and public safety in their community, while 61 per cent said the justice system in B.C. does not achieve the appropriate balance between the rights of offenders and those of victims. Notably, more than 83 per cent said they support: modifying the bail system to ensure repeat offenders remain in custody while awaiting trial; establishing harsher penalties, including incarceration for individuals convicted of multiple offenses; and new legislation to allow for confiscating assets of people convicted of drug trafficking offences.

On hand to explore what resources, reforms and actions are required to rebuild public confidence so there can be justice for all, including offenders, victims, and communities, will be panel members:

"These days, it seems every person arrested is already "known to police" as they continue to victimize residents and businesses due to a justice system that is too often under-resourced to process their cases in a timely matter or unwilling to pose stiffer penalties," says Jess Ketchum, Cofounder, SOS. "In every community, British Columbians have clearly indicated they are open to new ideas and willing to support new and expanded approaches to tackle crime and reform our justice system. We're looking forward to fascinating discussion in this first panel."

The day-long **Communities Driving Change Forum** at the Morris J. Wosk Centre for Dialogue in Vancouver will feature four professionally moderated, non-partisan and future-focused panel discussions on the justice system, housing, policing and addictions and mental illnesses (See agenda below).

Recognizing the need for possible new approaches, greater collaboration and informed decision making when it comes to addressing these decades-old issues, SOS has assembled an extraordinary group of subject matter experts, each with extensive experience and expertise in their fields.
